Let me tell you the Portuguese story. We are one of the countries with one of the highest rates of vaccination coverage in the world and this is due in large part to the work done by nurses. The National Vaccination Program was created in 1965 with the support of the World Health Organization. It is free and accessible to all citizens. In this process, nurses assume a central role. They are the ones who are at the forefront of awareness of the importance of the vaccine and continue to monitor it throughout their lives. The Portuguese trust vaccination also because they trust nurses.

The European Commission's figures leave no room for doubt, more than 95% of Portuguese people believe in the safety, effectiveness, and importance of vaccines under the National Vaccination Program. Here you can see the relevance of the role of Portuguese nurses in this process.

I wanted to tell this story so that they can get to know a little about the Portuguese reality. We are a country with a National Health Service (SNS) that functions as one of the pillars of democracy, with universal access and tending free of charge. The truth is that in recent years, and largely because of the failure of the successive governments to bet, this pillar has been weakened. Lack of investment and courage. One of the main problems has been the lack of appreciation of nurses. Wages are low and working conditions are difficult. This is the urgency of the moment in Portugal.
